HEMPSTEAD HOTEL CONVERSION

Village OKs plan for senior housing, stores

A plan to convert the Quality Hotel and Convention Center in Hempstead into retail stores and subsidized senior rentals has gotten a thumbs up from the Village of Hempstead.

The hotel's owner, Apple Core Hotels in Manhattan, has agreed to sell the 182-room property to Liberty Holdings LLC, a business affiliated with developer Frank Lalezarian of Great Neck, according to real estate sources.

Last Thursday, the Zoning Appeals Board approved a vari-ance to allow retail stores to be added on the ground floor.

Apple Core declined com-ment and Lalezarian could not be reached for comment. But industry sources say the hotel may cease operation by year

The proposal calls for 105 subsidized housing units for se-niors over 65, as well as

28,866-square-feet of retail along Clinton Street, according to village officials.

"It's a slam dunk for the vil-lage," says Mayor James Garner, who adds there will be no tax reduction on the property for 13 years.

The subsidies under the federal Section 8 program from the Department of Housing and Urban Development guarantees that low-income residents pay no more than 30 per-cent of their income in rent. More than a third of all rent-

ers on Long Island pay in ex-cess of 35 percent of their total income on rent, according to the Long Island Housing Part-

"This will help the communi-ty and revitalize that intersection," said Ralph Trionfo, presi-dent of Upside Ventures, a Manhattan real estate investment firm that is representing both Apple Core and Liberty. He said he conducted a national marketing campaign and

keep a hotel.
Village officials say there is a
real need for Section 8 units for
seniors. The Village of Hempstead Housing Authority has a waiting list of about 3,200 peo-ple for Section 8 seniors and families, said Frank Ashby, executive director of the agency. Advocates for seniors on Long Island complain about the chronic lack of affordable rent-

But David Mosley, president of the Hempstead Village Chamber of Commerce, said there is more need for afford-able rentals for young couples and families in the village. Still others say the proposal is bet-ter than what is there now and still keeps the building on the tax rolls

"I'd rather see something pos-itive there than an eyesore," noted Bill Hughes, president of the Coordinating Council of Civic Associations for the Village of Hempstead.
